Succeed: Study gives figures

Smith cited the Self Sufficiency Standard for Mississippi 2009 study released in September 2009 by the Mississippi Economic Policy Center.

"Research shows one third of Lafayette County residents are struggling to cover basic needs," Smith said. "The best time to start learning is early on."

MCEE is using the study to examine which occupations lead to self sufficiency, she said

The study showed a single person would need to earn \$8.34 an hour just to be self-sufficient in Lafayette County.

"But earning enough to be self-sufficient isn't enough," Smith said. "It's not sufficient to gain long-term economic security."

The study shows how much a single person or family would need to earn to be able to at least cover basic needs like rent, utilities and food.

In Lafayette County, the report shows a family with two parents and two school-age children would need to make \$8.53 an hour per adult to be self-sufficient, or a combined yearly salary of \$36,027. Costs for housing were averaged at \$700 — up 43 percent

since 2003 when the last Self Sufficiency Standard report was released. Child care costs average \$488 with health care costing about \$376 a month.

The report shows just the necessities and doesn't include cell phone bills, cable bills or entertainment money, although it does include a miscellaneous expense category. The report only shows the bare-bones of what it would take to be self-sufficient — which means they're not receiving any local, state or federal income assistance.
